## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Dear Mayors, Business Council, Partners and Supporters,

During the 2019 - 2020 fiscal year, the African American Mayors Association (AAMA) was at the forefront of providing resources to our mayors to battle the dual crises of COVID-19 and racial injustice. We also worked to ensure the stability of AAMA for years to come.

We are living in very tumultuous times as a country. However, thanks to the commitment of our member mayors, financial supporters, partner organizations, and the dedicated AAMA staff, AAMA has not missed a beat since transitioning to virtual engagement at the beginning of the pandemic. While we have had to adjust our processes and shift our policy focus to the emergent national crises, the results of our efforts are undeniable – AAMA continues to be the premier voice representing Black mayors on the national stage.

At the start of the pandemic, AAMA assembled our member mayors and business council partners for two member-wide calls to action on how we can work together to ensure our communities successfully combat COVID-19. The following are key activities that the Association led to support cities of all sizes battling the pandemic.

- From May through July of 2020, the Association submitted four different letters to Congress, the Department of Labor, and the White House on matters ranging from decreasing the 500,000 population threshold in the first stimulus bill to requesting the reinstatement of affirmative action protections during this time of crisis.
- We partnered with Civil Rights Organizations on a letter requesting the Centers for Disease Control begin tracking and reporting COVID-19 cases and outcomes using racial, ethnic and other disaggregated data.
- The AAMA Board of Trustees submitted a letter to President Trump, calling for his Administration to require states, state health departments, medical facilities, and entities that received federal funding to report similar data on COVID-19 testing and cases.
- We partnered with Members of the Congressional Black Caucus to identify important resources for our cities and advocate for additional support for the most vulnerable members of our communities. Our collective voices were heard nationally in publications such as USA Today News, CNN, The Washington Post and Essence to name a few.

Due to the racial and social injustice and calls for change heard around the country, a group of member mayors and staff created the Mayors P.E.A.C.E. Pact for Community Centered Policing. In July of 2020, The Washington Post highlighted the Pact, giving us the opportunity to share our important work with an even larger audience.

We also enhanced our communications capabilities by launching the "Our Mayors Podcast," available on all podcast streaming platforms. In September 2020, we partnered with BET and the National Urban League on the inaugural National Black Voter Day, where we urged Black communities to "reclaim our vote" by increasing voter registrations in Black communities. We also held our Virtual Fall Policy Series to discuss fostering civic engagement and community trust.

In December 2020, we shared our "100 Day" priorities with the Biden-Harris Transition team, and we are eager to work with the Biden Administration on issues most pressing to Black communities including supporting HBCUs, closing the wealth gap, ending the digital divide, and police reform. We plan to use our collective voice to promote equitable economic growth and advance racial equity.

In the midst of these unprecedented times, AAMA has continued to work diligently to uplift the priorities of our mayors nationwide. To meet the growing portfolio of the Association, the Board approved two additional full-time staff members and a 12-month Tech Policy Fellow, sponsored by Google, to join the AAMA team in 2021. We are also expanding our Future Leader Fellows summer program from three fellows in summer 2020 to eleven fellows in summer 2021 with the generous support of Amazon and Verizon.

While we could not have planned for the challenges we would face in 2020, we are extremely proud of how our organization adapted to meet the needs of our member mayors during multiple crises. As we plan for the equitable distribution of the COVID-19 vaccine in our communities while simultaneously continuing important dialogues on systemic racism and social justice, AAMA will remain a leader in advocacy, public policy, and national change. Thank you for your support, flexibility, and dedication to AAMA.



In July 2019, AAMA began the Future of Work in Cities Tour with forums in Houston, Texas, Columbia, South Carolina and Cambridge, Massachusetts. This three-city event provided an in-depth overview of how the future of work will impact Black and Latino workers in cities. Through our forums, we discussed how our research recommendations can be utilized as a tool to cultivate workforce development opportunities.

### MEMBER-WIDE CALL SERIES: RESPONDING TO COVID 19

In March 2020, AAMA assembled member mayors and business council partners for two member-wide calls to action on how we may work together to ensure our communities successfully combat COVID-19.

### LETTERS TO FEDERAL OFFICIAL

In 2020, from March to July, AAMA submitted 5 different letters: to Congress, the Department of Labor, and The White House on matters ranging from decreasing the 500,000 population threshold in the first stimulus bill to requesting the reinstatement of affirmative action protections. AAMA also partnered with the NAACP, PolicyLink, and 3 other civil rights organizations on a letter requesting the CDC to begin tracking and reporting COVID-19 cases and outcomes using disaggregated data.

### **FUTURE LEADERS FELLOWSHIP**

In the Summer of 2020, AAMA welcomed its first cohort of Future Leader Fellows. Over the course of 6 weeks, these virtual fellows completed a range of assignments centered around racial and economic justice policy.

### **PEACE PACT**

In June 2020, AAMA released a pact dubbed the "PEACE Pact" to reform policing nationwide. The pact, which aims for community-centered policing, provides a framework for discussion generated by Black mayors and some of the best practices they are seeing in their communities.





FINANCIALS JULY 2019 - JUNE 2020






#### **REVENUE BREAKDOWN**

In fiscal year 2019–2020, AAMA earned most revenue through events/programs, business council dues and mayors dues, representing 44.2%, 31% and 17.5% of revenue respectively. After the cancellation of AAMA's 2020 Annual Conference, due to COVID–19, many of our business partners donated their sponsorships to ensure the sustainability of AAMA.

### 2019-2020 REVENUE

In fiscal year 2019-2020, AAMA brought in a total of \$1.2M in revenue. With operations and programs expenses at \$796,282.66, AAMA netted at total of \$444,628.92.





#### **GROWTH BY REVENUE**

Over the past 5 years, AAMA has experienced substantial growth. In fiscal year 2018–2019, AAMA raised \$1.8M in revenue. Despite COVID–19's impact on the nonprofit sector, AAMA maintained a strong financial standing in fiscal year 2019–2020, earning the second highest yearly revenue in the organization's history.
