



BLACK MAYORS CAN PLAY FOUR KEY ROLES POST-ROE AND DOBBS



EXECUTIVES

Mayors may be able to provide resources to residents seeking reproductive services, keep residents apprised of the state law, and support local organizations providing reproductive access services.



EMPLOYERS

Mayors may be able to lead by example by ensuring their employees have health coverage supporting access to abortions and contraceptive care (if allowed by state law) and/or provide reimbursement for travel to employees seeking services out of state.



CHIEF LEOs

Mayors can secure healthcare facilities, propose laws prohibiting the use of City resources in enforcing state law and partner with local District Attorneys to deprioritize enforcement or pursue a policy of full non-enforcement of state law.



ADVOCATES

Mayors can advocate for changes in state law, connect residents with services in more permissive jurisdictions, and encourage companies in their cities to provide reproductive access consistent with state law.



MAYORS AS EXECUTIVES

DIRECT SUPPORT

Some jurisdictions like St. Louis County have leveraged APRA to provide direct support to residents seeking reproductive healthcare services.

PROTECT RESIDENTS AND FACILITIES

Mayors can dispatch additional law enforcement officers to protect women seeking reproductive healthcare services and the facilities that provide reproductive healthcare services.

DIRECT SUPPORT

Cities can provide financial support to women's health organizations that help residents access reproductive healthcare services.

MONITORING STATE LAW

All AAMA mayors should consider special task forces to monitor changes in the law governing this space in their states.



MAYORS AS CHIEF LEOS

DISCOURAGE ARRESTS

Like, some progressive prosecutors that signed on to not prosecute those seeking abortions, Mayors can encourage their police departments to de-prioritize enforcement.

PROTECT ABORTION CLINICS

Mayors can dispatch additional law enforcement officers to protect women seeking reproductive healthcare services and the facilities that provide them.

DISCOURAGE ARRESTS

Mayor can codify their non-enforcement posture through resolutions and/or ordinances governing the use of public resources for enforcement, non-enforcement partnerships with local DAs, etc.

PARTNERSHIPS

Organizations like Fair and Just Prosecution are natural partners for organizations like AAMA post-Dobbs



MAYORS AS EMPLOYERS

PROTECTING EMPLOYEES

Every AAMA mayor should determine the scope of their City's health insurance coverage to determine if reproductive healthcare services are provided and relevant state law.

REIMBURSING EXPENSES

A common response from employers has been reimbursing the travel expenses of their employees and/or their partners that seek to secure reproductive healthcare services.

OTHER LOCAL EMPLOYERS

Mayor can urge local employers to adopt best practices post-Dobbs and advocate for changes in state law (if applicable).



MAYORS AS ADVOCATES

COORDINATED COMMS

Mayors can execute a coordinated media strategy to amplify messaging on their efforts to protect women's rights.

COORDINATING ORGS

AAMA can work directly with other orgs like Fair and Just Prosecution to support aligned initiatives and improve coordination amongst other groups.

STATE ADVOCACY

Mayors often have lobbyists they employ on state issues. Expanding reproductive health access and enacting privacy protections to protect residents' personal information as they seek reproductive healthcare services.

LEVERAGING BUSINESS COUNCIL

AAMA Mayors can work with the Business Council to glean best practices and possibly provide resources to national efforts to support to provide access to residents in more restrictive jurisdictions.



STRATEGIC PLANNING

MISSION

Align AAMA around key objectives and initiatives to reclaim women's rights and improve maternal health outcomes.

EDUCATE

Educate AAMA Mayors about what the law is in their states and what they can do to protect their constituents.

STRATEGIZE

Establish key initiatives and a menu of actions mayors can take. Coordinate with other mayors, orgs., and the private sector.

MOBILIZE

Take paper to the pavement arranging a series of AAMA actions advancing key initiatives across AAMA Cities.



INITIATIVE: EDUCATING MAYORS

EDUCATING MAYORS

IMPACT

Unifying on what the current state of the law is and what interventions are legally available to mayors in vulnerable cities is critical to effective advocacy.

EFFORT

AAMA could coordinate meetings with the City Attorneys of vulnerable cities to determine what interventions are legally available to mayors.



INITIATIVE: DEVELOPING STRATEGY

STRATEGIZE

IMPACT

Developing an agenda of key initiatives will help Mayors successfully navigate the post roe landscape to advance initiatives to support maternal health.

EFFORT

Based on this presentation, AAMA should develop a toolkit document and agenda for AAMA Mayors and coordinate meetings to disseminate the information and implement strategy.



INITIATIVE: MOBILIZE

MOBILIZING MAYORS

IMPACT

Implementing a coordinated strategy will help give cover to mayors in vulnerable cities and amplify messaging around support for women's rights and access maternal healthcare.

EFFORT

Ice Miller and Raben will coordinate with AAMA to implement the strategic initiatives and execute an effective media plan.

TEXAS	Currently allowed up to 6 weeks. However, Texas's trigger ban (with no exceptions for rape or incest) will take effect once the U.S. Supreme Court issues its formal judgement this summer.	DeSoto Prairie View Houston Willis Manor

ОНІО	Abortion is banned after six weeks of pregnancy, with no exceptions for rape or incest, after a judge allowed an older law to go into effect. Planned Parenthood and the A.C.L.U. have filed a lawsuit in an attempt to block the ban.	Cleveland Urbancrest Elyria Warrensville Heights
SOUTH CAROLINA	Abortion is banned after six weeks of pregnancy, after a judge allowed an older law to go into effect. There is an exception to save the mother's life and in rape, but the doctor must report the rape. TENNESSEE	Abortion is banned after six weeks of pregnancy, after a judge allowed an older law to go into effect. A trigger law banning nearly all abortions, with no exceptions for rape or incest, takes effect soon, likely this summer.	Bolivar Brownsville



	THE LAW	AAMA CITIES
ARIZONA	AZ AG is pushing to enforce a pre-Roe state abortion ban with no exceptions for rape or incest and criminalizes providers. The law was blocked by a court in 1973, but its unclear if Roe triggered its enforcement. A ban at 15 weeks of pregnancy, that was signed by the governor, will take effect in September.	Tucson Tempe
KENTUCKY	A court temporarily blocked the state's total abortion ban as well a ban on abortion after six weeks of pregnancy. A ban on abortion after 15 weeks of pregnancy is in effect.	Hopkinsville
FLORIDA	Abortion is banned after 15 weeks of pregnancy. Abortion providers and advocates have sued to try to block the ban.	Miramar St. Petersburg South Floral Park West Palm Beach

	THE LAW	AAMA CITIES
LOUISIANA	A trigger ban on all abortions with no exceptions for rape or incest was recently blocked and is being contested in the court. The only exception on the proposed ban is for "medically futile" pregnancies.	Alexandria New Orleans Baton Rouge Shreveport Lake Providence Ville Platte
GEORGIA	The state enacted a ban on abortion after six weeks of pregnancy, but a court blocked it in 2020. The state filed an appeal after the Supreme Court's decision on Dobbs but a judge has not ruled on the case.
